Although no action may be taken, the Commission and staff will follow up, at an appropriate time, on those items needing response. Each speaker is limited to (3) three minutes. Time may be surrendered by deferring (1) one minute to another speaker, not to exceed a total of (8) eight minutes. The speaker wishing to defer time must be present when the item is heard. In order to be recognized and present an item, each speaker must complete and submit to the Recording Secretary a Request to Speak form prior to the beginning of the item being announced by the Chair (forms are available at the entrance to the meeting room). Speakers are taken in the order slips are submitted.

**Items in Consent Calendar Section A** have already been considered by the Commission at a previous meeting where the public was invited to comment, after which a decision was made. These items are not subject to public discussion at this meeting because the vote taken at the previous meeting was final. Resolutions concerning decisions made at previous meetings are for the purpose of memorializing the decision to assure the accuracy of the findings, the prior vote, and any conditions imposed.

**Items in Consent Calendar Section B** have not been discussed previously by the Commission. If discussion is desired, an item may be removed from the Consent Calendar for individual consideration. Commissioners may indicate a negative or abstaining vote on any individual item by so declaring prior to the vote on the motion to adopt the entire Consent Calendar. Items excluded from the Consent Calendar will be taken up by the Commission following the action on the Consent Calendar. The Commission first will take up the items for which public speaker requests have been submitted. Public speakers shall follow the rules as set forth under Oral Communication.



CALL TO ORDER

Chair Saul called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m.

ROLL CALL

The following persons were recorded in attendance by the Recording Secretary:

PRESENT: Chair David Saul; Vice Chair Chris Frost; and Commissioners Marlene Matlow, Meril May (arrived at 5:03 p.m.), and Carol Randall

ALSO PRESENT: Reva Feldman, City Manager; Arthur Aladjajian, Public Works Superintendent; Lieutenant Jim Royal, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department; and Mary Linden, Recording Secretary

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Chair Frost led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION Chair Saul moved and Commissioner Matlow seconded a motion to approve the agenda with Item No. 4.C. to be heard before Item No. 4.B. The motion carried unanimously.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

Recording Secretary Linden reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on April 27, 2016.

ITEM 1.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

None.

ITEM 1.B. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Matlow discussed service problems related to Frontier Communications' takeover of Verizon service in Malibu. She expressed concern about residents' ability to communicate and receive information if a disaster occurs. Recording Secretary Linden stated City Manager Feldman had been talking with Frontier management regarding the service stoppages.

Commissioner Matlow reported she and Commissioner Randall attended the PCH Task Force meeting this morning. She expressed frustration with local agencies from Santa Monica to the Ventura County line that refused to give up jurisdiction along the highway. She discussed the history of law enforcement coverage on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH). Commissioner May stated Lt. Royal has worked very hard to improve interagency communication.

Deputy Jennifer Glennan stated the Sheriff's Department always investigated any incidents on PCH to see if there was something deputies could do to improve the flow of traffic.

City Manager Feldman stated she would reach out to the Vice President of Frontier regarding the ongoing problems. She requested names and addresses of any individuals with problems be sent to her office so she could forward them to Frontier.

Commissioner Randall agreed with Commissioner Matlow that one agency covering PCH would be best. She suggested more elected officials be urged to attend the PCH Task Force meetings.

Vice Chair Frost stated the City needs more Sheriff's coverage on PCH.

- A.      Recommendations for Commission Assignments in Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017  
Recommended Action: Review Commission assignments from FY 2015-2016, remove completed assignments, add new issues for consideration and recommend that the City Council approve the revised task list for assignment in FY 2016-2017.

Recording Secretary Linden presented the report. She requested consensus from the Commission on carryover assignments. She asked for other suggestions to be added.

Chair Saul requested the Beach Team deployment be presented to the Commission sooner than it has in the past. He requested a summary of VOP activity be included in the monthly Sheriff's Department reports.

Commissioner Randall requested the Commission be involved in monitoring of the action items of the PCH Safety Study.

MOTION Commissioner Randall moved and Chair Saul seconded a motion to recommend the City Council approve the following tasks for assignment in FY 2016-2017:

- Review and make a recommendation on the preliminary design of the Civic Center Widening Project
- Conduct quarterly reviews of the City's Emergency Preparedness Program
- Conduct an annual review of Fire Department and Lifeguard services
- Review the proposed Summer 2017 Beach Team deployment schedule
- Make bimonthly oral reports to the City Council on Commission activity
- Submit a mid-year written report to the City Council on Commission activity
- Perform post-disaster assessment of City response, as necessary
- Review and provide input on the preliminary designs for projects resulting from the PCH Safety Study

The question was called and the motion carried unanimously.

C. Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

Recommended Action: 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) Point Dume Traffic Management Plan; b) Caltrans Shoreline Stabilization and Protection Project; and c) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

Commissioner May reported that ongoing problems with parked vehicles and brush obstructing motorists' sightlines near pocket beaches was discussed at the PCH Task Force meeting today. He stated creating No Parking/Tow Away zones was being considered. He discussed new signage near Malibu Seafood. In response to Commissioner May, Public Works Superintendent Aladjadjian stated the City had just begun its regular brush removal activities. Commissioner May stated Caltrans needed to do more and better grading on the highway. He discussed missing or defaced signage near Surfrider Beach and the need for

guardrails or more reflectors on canyon roads. He requested golf cart rules and regulations be shared through NextDoor Point Dume.

In response to Chair Saul, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated Caltrans was adjusting timing of the signal on eastbound PCH to northbound Kanan Dume Road to improve traffic flow.

Lt. Royal stated he would coordinate with Los Angeles County Beaches and Harbors to improve traffic flow near the Zuma Beach parking lot. He stated he would look into having a changeable message sign posted there.

Chair Saul discussed problems on Westward Beach Road due to vehicles parking or waiting to park along the road.

Commissioner Randall discussed problems making U-turns near Duke's due to worn paving. She requested history of why the County of Los Angeles has not installed guardrails on the canyon roads, particularly Malibu Canyon Road.

Commissioner Matlow stated many existing guardrails are installed in the wrong place. She requested Los Angeles County Public Works representatives attend a future Commission meeting. She requested the Sheriff's Department provide the number of cars that have gone over the side of canyon roads.

In response to Chair Saul, Lt. Royal confirmed that the County installed boulders on Kanan Dume Drive due to the number of cars intentionally driven over the side of the road.

Commissioner Matlow requested the City ask Caltrans to conduct PCH remediation work during night hours to lessen traffic impacts. Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated one reason for work done in day hours was to not disturb nearby residents.

Chair Saul commended the Public Works Department for its proactive work. He stated it is a testament to the leadership in the department.

Deputy Jennifer Glennan suggested changing southbound Malibu Canyon Road to eastbound Civic Center Way to have a protected left turn lane in order to reduce the number of collisions. Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated it could be considered as part of the Civic Center Widening Project.

#### CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Commission agreed to hear Item Nos. 4.B. and 4.D concurrently.

- B. 2016 Summer Enforcement Team Proposal  
Recommended Action: Review the Sheriff's Department proposal for the 2016 Summer Enforcement Team deployment and recommend that the City Council approve the proposal as part of the Sheriff's Budget for Fiscal Year 2016-2017.
- D. Public Safety Agency Activity  
Recommended Action: Discuss recent Public Safety Agency activities and receive and file monthly activity reports from the County of Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, Fire Department and Lifeguard Division.

Commissioner Matlow discussed problems with parking in Point Dume. She stated the parking area in the Point Dume Headlands needed to be increased. Commissioner May suggested additional parking spaces at La Piedra Beach.

Lt. Royal discussed the increase in crowds at beaches and trails due to the increase in social media posting.

Chair Saul stated the City should have a motorcycle deputy and extra patrol car covering the west side. Lt. Royal stated a car was previously assigned to cover the areas west of Paradise Cove, but collision data no longer supported that dedicated coverage. He stated it would take away coverage from the area east of John Tyler where more incidents occurred. He explained that, with limited resources, deployment has to be determined based on crash data. He clarified that during the summer deployment, one patrol vehicle would remain on the west side. He stated deployment was determined by the Lost Hills Captain and the City Manager with input from the Commission taken into consideration.

Vice Chair Frost stated having the same deputies covering the City and becoming more familiar with the community improves safety.

Lt. Royal stated Deputy Winn would be writing an article regarding traffic safety. He discussed ongoing increases in the number of citations issued in Point Dume. In response to Commissioner Matlow's inquiry at the April 6, 2016 Commission meeting, Lt. Royal stated no report was written on the golf cart accident because it occurred on private property and no report had been requested.

Lt. Royal stated parking enforcement would be increased this summer. He reviewed the summer deployment schedule. He recognized that parking enforcement has greatly increased thanks to the contributions of the Volunteers on Patrol (VOP).

In response to Commissioner May, Lt. Royal stated County Beaches and Harbors reported approximately 110,000 people came to Zuma Beach on one exceptionally hot day in Summer 2014. He stated it is estimated that 6-8 million visitors come to Malibu beaches each year.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Lt. Royal stated the County provides valuable air support each summer.

Commissioner May suggested the City's public relations department promote all that the City provides to visitors.

Chair Saul stated the reduced number of incidents in recent summers was a direct result of the great work of the Sheriff's Beach Team. Lt. Royal stated increased enforcement of alcohol on the beach also greatly impacted safety.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Lt. Royal explained that the Beach Team includes roving deputies who go to all beaches up and down PCH to the city limits. In response to Commissioner Randall, he clarified that the Beach Team does not cover Topanga Beach because it is outside the city limits, but would be available to provide assistance if needed. Deputy Jennifer Glennan clarified that roving deputies get out and walk the beaches.

Lt. Royal commended the VOP for the excellent work they provide the City and the Sheriff's Department. He stated they helped with traffic control in addition to their parking enforcement duties.

Commissioner Matlow asked if Lt. Royal is satisfied that the Summer Enforcement proposal will adequately handle the City's summer needs. Lt. Royal stated he was confident that the Beach Team would continue to be successful and that resources would be made available if there was an uncommon occurrence.

Vice Chair Frost left the dais at 6:29 p.m.

In response to Chair Saul, Lt. Royal stated the City's Automatic License Plate Recognition (ALPR) car is currently in use.

**MOTION** Commissioner Randall moved and Commissioner Matlow seconded a motion to recommend that the City Council approve the 2016 Summer Enforcement Team deployment as part of the Sheriff's Budget for Fiscal Year 2016-2017. The motion carried 4-0, Vice Chair Frost absent.

Vice Chair Frost returned to the meeting at 6:33 p.m.

**ITEM 1.A. PUBLIC COMMENT (continued)**

Chair Saul reopened Public Comment.

Don Schmitz discussed the history of the Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29 (District 29) plans to upgrade the water system and water storage in Malibu. He stated District 29 initiated a programmatic environmental impact report (EIR) to upgrade the existing system and improve substandard-sized

storage tanks. He stated a public hearing was scheduled two weeks ago, but residents from Calabasas vehemently opposed the project. He stated that, as a result of this opposition, District 29 decided to conduct additional community outreach. He stated a new hearing was tentatively scheduled in June 2016. He explained that the existing system was built with asbestos and concrete pipes. He stated he is working with the Mayor, City Manager and Planning staff to move the program forward. He stated it was wrong to allow people from outside the City to stop a project intended to protect Malibu residents.

In response to Chair Saul, Mr. Schmitz requested the Commission express its strong support for: 1) moving forward on a District 29 programmatic EIR, and 2) improving the water tank on Avenue de la Encinal.

#### CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Commission requested that discussion of District 29 improvements to Malibu's water system and water storage be placed on the next agenda.

City Manager Feldman reported the Vice President of Frontier requested that she forward him names, addresses and phone numbers of anyone who has been seriously impacted by Frontier service interruptions.



Chair Saul called the meeting to order at 5:09 p.m.

ROLL CALL

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

Recording Secretary Ayala reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on May 25, 2016.

ITEM 1.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

ITEM 1.B. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner May discussed concerns about Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) maintenance and the Memorial Day weekend traffic.

In response to Commissioner May's concerns about PCH, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian reported that Caltrans had graded the shoulder near Moonshadows.

Commissioner May noted that Caltrans had installed no parking signs at El Matador, El Pescador and San Nicolas Beaches, as well as near Malibu Seafood.

Commissioner Matlow expressed her concern with service provided by Frontier Communications and requested an item be placed on a future agenda. She requested a joint meeting with the Public Works Commission and the Public Safety Commission.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated that staff would be presenting the draft valet ordinance to the City Council on June 27, 2016.

ITEM 4        NEW BUSINESS

- A.    Emergency Preparedness Program Quarterly Report  
Recommended Action: Receive and file update on the City's Emergency Preparedness Program activities for the period of March through May 2016.

Emergency Services Coordinator Davis presented the report. He discussed trainings held during the period of March through May 2016. He stated the City received a new disaster response container for Malibu West.

In response to Commissioner Matlow, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis stated he had requested funding for the purchase of emergency supplies for all disaster response containers be included in the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Budget. He

explained that supplies were typically replaced every five years and that the City did not have a program in place to accept donations from the public.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis stated the City had three disaster response containers located at Malibu High School, Trancas Canyon Road and Point Dume Marine Science Elementary School, with additional supplies located at Las Flores Creek Park. He stated staff was working on additional locations in the middle of town.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis stated a container located near Webster Elementary School was owned by the City and also contained disaster response supplies.

B. Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

Recommended Action: 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs; b) Amgen Tour of California; c) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project; d) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian presented the report.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated that an approved traffic control plan would be required for work performed on PCH and the contractor would need to have a permit issued by Caltrans.

In response to Chair Saul, Public Works Director Brager stated that law enforcement presence would not typically be required by Caltrans for construction work. He stated that Caltrans monitored PCH.

In response to the Commission's concerns regarding the recent incident at the Bel Air Bay Club, Lieutenant Royal stated that it was outside the Sheriff's Department's jurisdiction and was the responsibility of Los Angeles Police Department.

Commissioner Matlow requested that staff discuss with Caltrans the incident at the Bel Air Bay Club and the need for better traffic control plans for work being done on PCH.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated the La Costa intersection improvements project was still in design. He stated staff was working with Caltrans on some design exceptions. He explained that

narrowness of the State's right-of-way in the project area made it difficult for the design consultant to identify where to install the signal and crosswalk equipment.

Chair Saul requested an update on the La Costa project be added to a future agenda.

Commissioner May left the meeting at 5:47 p.m.

In response to Commissioner Matlow, Public Works Director Brager stated staff would investigate and report back on posted speed limits on Birdview Avenue, as well as signage.

In response to Commissioner Matlow, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated that there would be four speed advisory signs installed in the Point Dume neighborhood. City Clerk Pope added that the contract for the speed advisory signs project would be presented to the City Council for approval on June 14, 2016.

Guy Blake, Volunteers on Patrol (VOP), reported the VOP had been monitoring Grasswood Avenue and Fernhill Drive and issuing citations for parking violations of the newly striped edge line.



Subject: Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

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**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs; b) Engineering and Traffic Survey; c) Valet Attendant Safety Requirements; d) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project; and e) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

**DISCUSSION:** Below are the latest updates on the status of projects in and around Malibu that affect traffic and public safety on PCH and City streets:

- a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs – This project proposes to install six speed advisory signs, with four in the Point Dume neighborhood and two on Busch Drive. The contractor has currently ordered the signs, which are expected to be installed in September.
- b) Engineering and Traffic Survey – At its Regular meeting on June 27, 2016, the City Council approved and adopted the Engineering and Traffic Survey to establish speed limits on City streets. Included in the Council action was the lowering of speed limits from 30 miles per hour (mph) to 25 mph on six street segments in the City:
- Big Rock Drive between Cool Oak Way and PCH
  - Busch Drive between Merritt Drive and PCH
  - Carbon Canyon Road between Carbon Mesa and PCH
  - Cliffside Drive between Birdview Avenue and Fernhill Drive

- Wildlife Road between Zumirez Drive and the end of the road
- Bluewater Road between Birdview Avenue and Dume Drive

The Council is scheduled to adopt Ordinance No. 408 on August 8, 2016, which will update Malibu Municipal Code (MMC) Chapter 10.08 to include the new speed limits on these six street segments.



The Council also considered the recommendation of the Public Safety Commission to lower the speed limit from 40 mph to 35 mph on Civic Center Way from Malibu Canyon Road to Webb Way. However, the Council chose to not lower that speed limit because, as explained by the City's Traffic Engineer, the lower speed limit would not be enforceable in court because it did not meet the 85th percentile required by California Vehicle Code (CVC) and California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CA-MUTCD) guidelines, which provide law enforcement officials the means to cite and control reckless and unreliable drivers.

- c) Valet Attendant Safety Requirements – At its Regular meeting on July 11, 2016, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 407 (Attachment 2) adding MMC Chapter 9.38 requiring valets to wear high visibility safety apparel when providing valet services in the public right-of-way, as recommended by the Public Safety Commission. Copies of the ordinance will be distributed to valet parking operators in the City by Volunteers on Patrol (VOP), who will also be prepared to answer any questions the valet operators or attendants may have regarding the new requirements. The Planning Department will also include ordinance requirements as conditions of approval for permits where valet parking will be used, including conditional use permits, temporary use permits and special event permits. The ordinance becomes effective August 11, 2016, 30 days after adoption.
- d) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project (City of Santa Monica) – According to the City of Santa Monica, the California Incline Project is scheduled for completion in September 2016. The new structure will meet current seismic standards and will include a wider sidewalk and bicycle lanes.
- e) Caltrans Maintenance Work (PCH within Malibu) – According to Caltrans, highway maintenance crews replaced damaged/missing median paddles throughout Malibu, performed shoulder and median brush clearance, and completed minor shoulder grading.

The Commission may provide staff with a list of questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans. Responses to those questions will be reported back to the Commission at its next Regular meeting.

Subject: Engineering and Traffic Survey

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**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** 1) Approve and adopt the Engineering and Traffic Survey to establish speed limits; and 2) Consider the recommendation of the Public Safety Commission to lower the speed limit from 40 mph to 35 mph on the segment of Civic Center Way from Malibu Canyon Road to Webb Way.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

**DISCUSSION:** Engineering and Traffic Surveys serve as the basis for the establishment and enforcement of speed limits. The national Uniform Vehicle Code and California Vehicle Code (CVC) Section 40802 (a) require that municipalities evaluate speed zones on a regular basis to ensure that the posted speed limits are justified for the road conditions. The City of Malibu is responsible for conducting speed surveys on local Malibu street segments. The City's Speed Survey does not include roads or highways that the City does not own, operate or maintain such as private streets within the City limits or Pacific Coast Highway/State Route 1. Per CVC Sections 627 and 40802, speed surveys can be valid for up to 10 years as long as a registered engineer evaluates the road conditions and determines that no significant changes have been made to the roadway or traffic conditions.

The City Council approved the City's current Engineering and Traffic Survey in 2007. In order to ensure that the posted speed limits are justified for current conditions and validate the City's use of radar enforcement, a new speed survey was conducted along Malibu streets in 2014 by the City's Traffic Engineer, Kimley Horn. The Engineering and Traffic Survey includes the review and analysis of 41 road segments within the City limits and was prepared in accordance with the CVC and the California Manual on Uniform

Traffic Control Devices (CA-MUTCD). The survey includes field observations, an inventory of road geometrics, a review of accident data, and an evaluation of surrounding land use and roadway crossings. It also includes other relevant site specific information such as roadway and roadside conditions that may contribute to special circumstances. The location and presence of existing speed limit signs were documented and analyzed and traffic counts were conducted for each road segment.

The 2016 Engineering and Traffic Survey (Attachment No. 1) includes recommendations for changes to the City's existing speed limits based on the standards established by the CVC and CA-MUTCD and the roadway data collected. Per CVC and CA-MUTCD, the primary guide to determining safe and reasonable speeds is the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed of traffic in the segment. The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed is defined as the speed at or below which 85 percent of the traffic is moving. Based on the analysis of the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed, the City's Traffic Engineers recommends that the speed limit be reduced by 5 miles per hour (MPH) along three (3) road segments:

On March 14, 2016, in response to residents' safety concerns regarding excessive speeds in the Point Dume Neighborhood Area (Point Dume), the Council directed staff to lower the speed limit on select roadway segments in Point Dume to the Residential District Prima Facie Speed Limit of 25 mph. The following three (3) roadway segments have been changed to 25 mph and are noted in the report.

SEGMENT NO.	SEGMENT LOCATION	EXISTING (POSTED) SPEED LIMIT	NEW SPEED LIMIT
12	Cliffside Drive between Birdview Avenue and Fernhill Drive	30 mph	25 mph
37	Wildlife Road between Zumirez Drive to the end	30 mph	25 mph
41	Bluewater Road between Birdview Avenue and Dume Drive	30 mph	25 mph

The speed limits on all others roadway segments reviewed in the study are proposed to remain unchanged.

On December 3, 2014, the Draft Engineering and Traffic Survey was presented to the Public Safety Commission for review and comments. The Public Safety Commission recommended that the City Council adopt the Draft Engineering and Traffic Survey and implement its speed limit recommendations with one amendment. The Commission recommended that Council consider lowering the speed limit from 40 mph to 35 mph on the segment of Civic Center Way from Malibu Canyon Road to Webb Way.

The City's Traffic Engineer and City staff reviewed the Commission's recommendation and recommend that the speed limit for Civic Center Way from Malibu Canyon Road to Webb Way remain 40 mph. The speed limit of 40 mph is based on the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed in accordance with the CVC and CA-MUTCD guidelines. Speed limits set on this basis provide law enforcement officials with a means to cite and control reckless and unreliable drivers who don't conform to the speed that the majority finds reasonable. If the speed limit was lowered to 35 mph, law enforcement personnel would be unable to enforce the speed limit. In addition to the significant enforcement issues this would cause, lowering the speed limit would create confusion and conflict amongst motorists, inhibit traffic operations and flow and may increase the rate of collisions.

Therefore staff recommends that Council approve and adopt the attached Engineering and Traffic Survey.

ORDINANCE NO. 407

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MALIBU ADDING CHAPTER 9.38 TO TITLE 9 (PUBLIC PEACE AND SAFETY) OF THE MALIBU MUNICIPAL CODE REQUIRING VALET PARKING ATTENDANTS TO WEAR HIGH-VISIBILITY SAFETY APPAREL WHILE PROVIDING VALET SERVICES IN ANY PUBLIC RIGHTS-OF-WAY WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; AND AMENDING SECTION 1.10.040 OF CHAPTER 1.10 (ADMINISTRATIVE CITATIONS AND PENALTIES) OF TITLE 1 (GENERAL PROVISIONS) OF THE MALIBU MUNICIPAL CODE TO REFLECT THAT VIOLATIONS OF CHAPTER 9.38 SHALL BE SUBJECT TO THE CITY'S ADMINISTRATIVE PENALTY PROVISIONS

The City Council of the City of Malibu does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 9.38 is hereby added to of Title 9 (Public Peace and Welfare) of the Malibu Municipal Code to read as follows:

**Chapter 9.38**

**VALET ATTENDANT SAFETY REQUIREMENTS**

- 9.38.010**      **Definitions.**
- 9.38.020**      **High-visibility safety apparel required.**
- 9.38.030**      **Penalties.**

- 9.38.010**      **Definitions.**

For purposes of this chapter, the following terms have the following meaning:

A. "High-Visibility Safety Apparel" means any vest, shirt, or jacket which meets the following conditions: the outer material color shall be fluorescent orange-red, fluorescent yellow-green or a combination of the two as defined by the American National Standards Institute/International Equipment Safety Association for class 2 or 3 risk exposure; the retroreflective material shall be orange, yellow, white, silver, yellow-green, or a fluorescent version of these colors; and the apparel shall be designed to clearly identify the wearer as a person.

B. "Person" means any natural person, firm, partnership, association, corporation or other entity.

C. "Public Right-of-way" means any area within the City of Malibu designated for public use as a public street, pedestrian way or other thoroughfare, including but not limited to publicly maintained sidewalks, highways, roadways, avenues, lanes, or alleys.

D. "Retroreflective" means a vest, shirt, or jacket that is capable of clearly retro-reflecting light, under normal atmospheric conditions, from a minimum distance of 1,000 feet when illuminated by the head lights of standard automobiles.

E. "Valet Parking" means the receiving, taking possession of, driving, moving, parking or storing any vehicle that is left in one location to be driven to another location for parking, whether or not a charge is imposed for the valet parking service.

F. "Valet Parking Attendant" means any employee or agent of a Valet Parking Operator, or any employee or agent of a business providing Valet Parking to its customers, who receives, takes possession of or moves any vehicle, or who handles the keys to any vehicle left with the attendant for Valet Parking.

G. "Valet Parking Operator" means any person engaged in the business of Valet Parking, including any person contracting with a Valet Parking Operator to provide Valet Parking, or any person engaged in providing Valet Parking services to the public.

**9.38.020 High-Visibility Safety Apparel required.**

A. No Valet Parking Operator shall employ, direct or otherwise permit, a Valet Parking Attendant to park or retrieve any vehicle on, along, or across any Public Right-of-way, unless that Valet Parking Attendant is wearing High-Visibility Safety Apparel as specified in this chapter.

B. Valet Parking Attendants shall wear High-Visibility Safety Apparel at all times while Valet Parking on any Public Right-of-way, including while walking on, along or across any Public Right-of-way.

**9.38.030 Penalties.**

A. The City has determined that this chapter is necessary to protect health, life, and property of the City and its inhabitants.

B. Any violation of the provisions of this chapter by any person shall be subject to the administrative penalty provisions of Title 1 chapter 1.10 of this Code.

C. This chapter authorizes any deputy sheriff, or city employee or agent of the city designated by the director of any city department, to administer, implement, and enforce the provisions of this chapter.

SECTION 2. Subsection A of Section 1.10.040 of Chapter 1.10 (Administrative Citations and Penalties) of Title 1 (General Provisions) of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:


**1.10.040 Code violations subject to administrative penalty procedures.**

A. In addition to any criminal, civil or other legal remedy established by this code or other law that may be pursued to address violations of the municipal code, the violations described in the municipal code titles, chapters and sections listed below are subject to the administrative penalty procedures and other provisions of this chapter:



15. Chapter 15.16: Mechanical Code Adopted;
16. Title 17: Zoning.

**SCHOOL ISSUES**

Our Juvenile Intervention Unit Investigated bullying on a special needs bus at Point Dume School.

We Arrested/booked two Malibu High students for possession of marijuana.

**INTERVENTIONS**

No interventions were held this month.

**COMMUNITY / CRIMINAL ISSUES**

1. We conducted a monthly parental resource class at Lost Hills Sheriff's Station. This program was developed by our unit and is designed to educate parents about: 1) The current trends in juvenile behavior and delinquency, 2) Alcohol/narcotic awareness and recognition, 3) School policy and campus issues, 4) Gang awareness and negative peer relations, 5) Parental rights and responsibilities and, 6) Parental responses to incorrigible and/or delinquent behavior. We also addressed the specific concerns relating to the minor's behavior. We educated the minor and their parents of possible criminal behavior and the legal consequences. We offered suggestions and made recommendations to improve the minor's quality of life.
2. We spoke with numerous citizens and parents who called to question various juvenile concerns and issues in the community. We also provide the parents with various juvenile resource programs within our community.
3. We met with the Sylmar Juvenile Court District Attorney regarding the investigation and filing of criminal charges against juvenile offenders.
4. Our Unit met with Captain Pat Davoren throughout the month in order to keep him up to date regarding our unit's investigations and current juvenile issues within our city.
5. We entered juveniles into the Juvenile Automated Index system for various violations.
6. We made court appearances to testify as witnesses on the part of the People of the State of California and attended court proceedings in cases generated from the City of Malibu. We also investigated, prepared, and filed cases with the District Attorney's office. We additionally assisted other investigators in the preparation of cases for court.

7. We met with station narcotic detectives on a regular basis to exchange information regarding juvenile and drug related issues. We have worked with the narcotic detectives on several narcotic cases directly and indirectly involving juveniles.
8. Our Unit handled the processing and follow-up of various juvenile referrals brought to the attention of this unit (i.e., Juvenile Information Forms, Field Interview Cards, Juvenile Automated Index, and citations for various juvenile contacts with uniform personnel).



**C.COMMUNITY / CRIMINAL ISSUES**

1. We conducted a monthly parental resource class at Lost Hills Sheriff's Station. This program was developed by our unit and is designed to educate parents about: 1) The current trends in juvenile behavior and delinquency, 2) Alcohol/narcotic awareness and recognition, 3) School policy and campus issues, 4) Gang awareness and negative peer relations, 5) Parental rights and responsibilities and, 6) Parental responses to incorrigible and/or delinquent behavior. We also address the specific concerns relating to the minor's behavior. We educate the minor and their parents of possible criminal behavior and the legal consequences. We offer suggestions and make recommendations to improve the minor's quality of life.
2. We spoke with numerous citizens and parents who called to question various juvenile concerns and issues in the community. We also provide the parents with various juvenile resource programs within our community.
3. We met with the Sylmar Juvenile Court District Attorney regarding the investigation and filing of criminal charges against juvenile offenders.
4. We met with A/Captain Joshua Thai throughout the month in order to keep him up to date regarding our units' investigations and current juvenile issues within our city.
5. We entered juveniles into the Juvenile Automated Index system for various violations.
6. We made court appearances to testify as witnesses on the part of the People of the State of California and attended court proceedings in cases generated from the City of Malibu. We also investigated, prepared, and filed cases with the District Attorney's office. We additionally assisted other investigators in the preparation of cases for court.
7. We met with station narcotic detectives on a regular basis to exchange information regarding juvenile and drug related issues. We have worked with the narcotic detectives on several narcotic cases directly and indirectly involving juveniles.

8. We handled the processing and follow-up of various juvenile referrals brought to the attention of this unit (i.e., Juvenile Information Forms, Field Interview Cards, Juvenile Automated Index, and citations for various juvenile contacts with uniform personnel).

### Malibu Monthly Report for June 2016

- Meeting with Malibu City leaders letting them know that I would be their contact person for the stations newly formed CIT Team.
- Talked to and met with most of the Malibu deputies about the new CIT Team.
- Working with Lt Royal, Lt Winslow, Lt Baker and field Sgt's on Malibu city and EOC questions and needs.
- Met with Nobu staff about paparazzi issues in their parking lot and they sent me some YouTube videos showing paparazzi's running in the Nobu parking lot trying to get pictures and videos of celebrities visiting the restaurant .
- Contacted Malibu Country Estates HOA about people parking overnight without permits. CIT Team checked twice and EM shift made several checks, unable to find any violations.
- I did numerous follow up contacts with area residents and businesses by phone, email and in person who were affected by the "Old Fire" in Calabasas and Topanga that had questions about who ordered the evacuation and what "zones" to evacuate?
- Working with the Fire Dept., State and National Park rangers regarding this year's fire season.
- I put together several emergency preparedness information handouts (bug out bags 1 for each person and pet, every day carry bag, home supplies for several days ) on how to prepare yourself, family and pets for a quick evacuation or if you are unable to get back home for an extended period of time.
- Contacted Corral Cyn homeowner Kyle Roberts about ongoing problem with rehab patients walking the neighborhood smoking in a posted high fire danger area. I was unable to find anyone smoking on my 3 trips up there.
- Working with Malibu CART handing homeless outreach concerns, crimes and programs.
- Attended CART meetings and Homeless Connect Day event.
- Attended Malibu City Council, Point Dume Traffic Safety, Malibu Public Safety and Malibu 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade meetings.
- Attended public safety task force meetings with The Captain, Supervisor Kuehl's staff, State OEM, LACOFD, CALTRANS, Public Works and several other people.
- Assisted LHS D.B. Det. Taylor Re: contacting victims of residential burglaries and checking area for cameras and possible witnesses.



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- Worked with the city on the Point Parade permits and the types of vehicles allowed in the parade.
- Homeless Connect and Count Day debrief meeting at Malibu city hall with all agencies involved.
- Working with the city putting together a small Sheriff's office inside city hall. This room can be used for report writing, making and returning phone calls and picking up field needed supplies.
- Continue to work on putting together a list of all rehab and sober living homes in the city.
- Worked on the ongoing parking problems of commercial vehicles unloading at shopping centers. Area residents keep sending Lt Royal and Malibu city manager pictures of these parking issues. A check of the Ca Vehicle Code (CVC) shows that these large commercial trucks can legally park like that to load and unload their trucks. I reported my findings and CVC sections to both Lt Royal and Malibu city manager Reva Feldman.
- Attended and participated in the nationwide emergency communication Field Day disaster communications drill with LHS DCS.
- Contacted valet parking companies working at local restaurants about the new city ordinance on high visibility reflective vests the valet parkers must now wear.
- Working with traffic office and field deputies on trying to get more traffic enforcement in high traffic and traffic collision areas.
- Worked DUI check point and DUI saturation patrol in Malibu.
- Patrolled and mapped out good drivable fire roads leading in and out of Malibu and Topanga. These roads can be used by deputies to get in and out of the area in the event of a fire or an emergency that has caused heavy traffic on local roads that would add extended response times in and out of the area. CSO Westling and I are working on finding a way to get these routes overlaid on the MDC maps.
- Continue to seek new information from all 5 contract cities deputies on their cities to keep the LHS EOC books current.
- Monitor and respond to daily emails from Malibu city leaders, county and state staff members, special interest groups, residents and businesses regarding their needs and concerns in the city.
- Working with Deputy Woodard on learning how to handle city special event permits.


