The Oral Communication portion of the agenda is for members of the public to present items which are not listed on the agenda, but are under the subject matter jurisdiction of the Commission. Although no action may be taken, the Commission and staff will follow up, at an appropriate time, on those items needing response. Each speaker is limited to (3) three minutes. Time may be surrendered by deferring (1) one minute to another speaker, not to exceed a total of (8) eight minutes. The speaker wishing to defer time must be present when the item is heard. In order to be recognized and present an item, each speaker must complete and submit to the Recording Secretary a Request to Speak form prior to the beginning of the item being announced by the Chair (forms are available at the entrance to the meeting room). Speakers are taken in the order slips are submitted.

Items in Consent Calendar Section A have already been considered by the Commission at a previous meeting where the public was invited to comment, after which a decision was made. These items are not subject to public discussion at this meeting because the vote taken at the previous meeting was final. Resolutions concerning decisions made at previous meetings are for the purpose of memorializing the decision to assure the accuracy of the findings, the prior vote, and any conditions imposed.

Items in Consent Calendar Section B have not been discussed previously by the Commission. If discussion is desired, an item may be removed from the Consent Calendar for individual consideration. Commissioners may indicate a negative or abstaining vote on any individual item by so declaring prior to the vote on the motion to adopt the entire Consent Calendar. Items excluded from the Consent Calendar will be taken up by the Commission following the action on the Consent Calendar. The Commission first will take up the items for which public speaker requests have been submitted. Public speakers shall follow the rules as set forth under Oral Communication.




Items in New Business are items which are appearing for the first time for formal action. Public comment shall follow the rules as set forth under Oral Communication.

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Saul called the meeting to order at 5:08 p.m.

ROLL CALL

The following persons were recorded in attendance by the Recording Secretary:

PRESENT: Chair David Saul; Vice Chair Chris Frost; and Commissioners Marlene Matlow and Carol Randall (arrived at 5:24 p.m.)

ALSO PRESENT: Bob Brager, Public Works Director; Travis Hart, Senior Public Works Inspector; Brad Davis, Emergency Services Coordinator; Deputy Mike Treinen, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department; and Mary Linden, Recording Secretary

Recording Secretary Linden reported that Meril May had submitted his resignation from the Commission because he no longer lives within the Malibu city limits. She stated Councilmember House was scheduled to make an appointment to fill the vacancy at the September 12, 2016 City Council Regular meeting.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Meril May led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION Commissioner Matlow moved and Chair Saul seconded a motion to approve the agenda with the Election of Chair and Vice Chair moved after Item No. 4.D. The motion carried 3-0, Commissioner Randall absent.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

Recording Secretary Linden reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on August 31, 2016.

ITEM 1.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Meril May discussed brush clearance, overgrowth in drains, and surface repairs and overhead signage on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) that needed to be addressed. He discussed benefits of the changeable message signs (CMS) recently placed throughout the City. He discussed unsafe parking near El Matador Beach.

ITEM 1.B. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Matlow discussed mail theft and expressed displeasure that the Postal Service left packages on residents' doorsteps after hours. She requested the City follow up with State Parks about replacing the broken, unsafe stairway to the beach at the Point Dume Headlands. She thanked Public Works for changing the CMS near Malibu Canyon to advise motorists "Speed Limits Enforced."

Vice Chair Frost agreed with Mr. May regarding the problem of unsafe parking at El Matador Beach. He stated the same problem exists at Paradise Cove and that citations were not a deterrent. He stated he observed fewer violations of handicapped parking. He commended Deputy Treinen on behalf of himself and other residents for his ongoing efforts and compassion in his work with the homeless.

ITEM 2 CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Matlow requested corrections to her statements on page two of the August 3, 2016 minutes.

MOTION Commissioner Matlow moved and Vice Chair Frost seconded a motion to approve the Consent Calendar with corrections. The motion carried 4-0, Commissioner Randall absent.

ITEM 4 NEW BUSINESS

- A. Emergency Preparedness Program Quarterly Report
Recommended Action: Receive and file update on the City's Emergency Preparedness Program activities for the period of June through August 2016.

Emergency Services Coordinator Davis presented the report.

In response to Chair Saul, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis confirmed the City has water for 200 people for three days in each emergency supply location.

Commissioner Randall arrived at 5:24 p.m.

In response to Chair Saul, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis announced the next CERT program would run four consecutive Saturdays beginning October 15.

In response to Vice Chair Frost, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis stated mutual aid between CERT teams had been discussed, but the City had not yet received a request to provide aid. He stated CERT teams from neighboring cities trained together with Malibu's team. In response to Vice Chair Frost, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis confirmed the CERT team monitored the Old Fire that occurred on Mulholland Highway in June 2016, but Malibu CERT was not activated by Sheriff's Department.

In response to Chair Saul, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis reported that approval to replace outdated automated external defibrillator (AEDs) was scheduled for the September 26, 2016 City Council agenda.

Commissioner Matlow stated communication between agencies about traffic on PCH was still inadequate. Emergency Services Coordinator Davis stated he received great reporting from the Sheriff's Department's Malibu/Lost Hills Station, but that information from other agencies had not improved. He stated he receives any information sent to the PCH Task Force.

In response to Vice Chair Frost, Emergency Services Coordinator Davis discussed fire season preparation. He emphasized that it is the responsibility of all homeowners to be prepared. He discussed the City's communication preparations.

B. Update on Caltrans Maintenance Projects Recommended in the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Safety Study

Recommended Action: Receive and file status update of the Caltrans Maintenance Projects recommended in the PCH Safety Study.

Public Works Director Brager presented the report. He stated the PCH Safety Study recommended both maintenance and capital projects. He reviewed the maintenance projects in progress and stated he would provide an update on capital projects at the Commission's October 5, 2016 meeting.

Chair Saul requested clarification of what constituted overhead signage. Public Works Director Brager explained that fading and reflectivity issues required replacement.

Commissioner Randall asked if Caltrans conducted state of the highway inspections or if they waited for problems to be reported. Public Works Director Brager stated Caltrans inspected conditions over time. He discussed how the City assists Caltrans and stated the PCH Safety Study was a great help to Caltrans in planning work that needed to be done.

In response to Chair Saul, Public Works Director Brager stated the approximately 350 signs the City bought for Caltrans to install had been received and were in the City storage yard. Chair Saul requested acceleration of the sign installation. Public Works Director Brager reported that No Overnight Parking signs were going up on Malibu Road, Civic Center Way and Trancas Canyon Road.

In response to Vice Chair Frost, Senior Public Works Inspector Hart confirmed overhead signs at Morning View Drive were replaced prior to the start of the school year.

C. Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

Recommended Action: 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs; b) Engineering and Traffic Survey; c) Valet Attendant Safety Requirements; d) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project; e) Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Parking Master Plan; and f) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

Senior Public Works Inspector Hart presented the report. In response to Chair Saul, he stated speed limit signs had been adjusted to match new speed limits. Public Works Director Brager clarified that Dume Drive still had a 30 mph speed limit.

In response to Chair Saul, Mark Russo, Volunteers on Patrol (VOP), stated VOPs were communicating with valet operators throughout the City about the new valet safety ordinance and that establishments were complying. In response to Vice Chair Frost, he discussed how VOPs explained the new law to valets hired for private events. He stated some residents were unaware of the new requirements. He discussed problem with valets working for unpermitted, smaller parties and events.

In response to Commissioner Matlow, Chair Saul explained the fine schedule for violations of the valet ordinance.

Commissioner Randall stated it was reported at a recent Zoning Ordinance Revisions and Code Enforcement Subcommittee (ZORACES) meeting that the Malibu Beach Inn planned to replace its parking lot with a swimming pool. She expressed concern about their valets having to cross PCH to park cars at the Hertz lot the Inn had acquired across the highway.

Senior Public Works Inspector Hart reported that Caltrans had installed cautionary signs in front of Zuma Beach advising motorists and cyclists to watch for each other.

Chair Saul questioned whether substandard shoulders would be widened or if curbs would be painted red. Public Works Director Brager stated determining proper, safe parking and sight distance are goals of the PCH Parking Study. In response to Vice Chair Frost, Public Works Director Brager stated a 12-foot width is adequate, and 14 feet would be ideal. Commissioner Randall requested staff use caution before reducing residents' street parking.

Commissioner Randall discussed a blinking light at AE Wright Middle School in Calabasas that flashed and indicated a 25 mph speed limit when children were present. She asked if that type of light could be installed on Civic Center Way for Webster and Our Lady of Malibu Schools. Public Works Director Brager stated the City has a design contract for Civic Center Way improvements in which it could be considered.

Vice Chair Frost inquired about plans for signage related to safety issues between Malibu Seafood and Corral Canyon Road. Public Works Director Brager discussed the Caltrans median improvement project from Puerco Canyon or Latigo Canyon to Corral Canyon.

Commissioner Matlow asked if a pedestrian crossing with flashing lights could be added near Malibu Seafood. Public Works Director Brager stated he would bring it up to Caltrans. Commissioner Randall expressed concerns with installing a crosswalk mid-block on a street with a 60 mph speed limit.

In response to Chair Saul, Public Works Director Brager stated an overpass might be in the Caltrans median improvements project discussions.

D. Public Safety Agency Activity

Recommended Action: Discuss recent Public Safety Agency activities and receive and file monthly activity reports from the County of Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, Fire Department and Lifeguard Division.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Chair Saul explained that newer car carriers were being built with three axles making it legal for them to travel on PCH.

In response to Commissioner Matlow, Deputy Treinen stated he would instruct deputies to patrol the Point Dume Headlands area, including Cliffside and Birdview, and issue citations for illegal overnight parking.

Chair Saul commended the VOPs for the number of parking citations issued. He discussed a large drop in the number of hazardous violation citations issued.

Chair Saul discussed an email received regarding safety issues at the Malibu Library and requested it be added to an upcoming agenda.

Vice Chair Frost discussed an increase in the number of cyclists riding against traffic in the new bike lane.

Commissioner Randall requested that deputies note the bicycle violation code on citations so those statistics appear would appear on the Sheriff's Department's monthly report.

Deputy Treinen discussed recent thefts from vehicles parked in Malibu Country Estates. He stated most of the vehicles were unlocked.

Commissioner Matlow discussed an increase in mailbox thefts.

CEREMONIAL/PRESENTATIONS

A. Election of Chair and Vice Chair

MOTION Commissioner Matlow moved and Vice Chair Frost seconded a motion to nominate David Saul for Chair. The question was called and David Saul was unanimously elected Chair.

MOTION Commissioner Matlow moved and Commissioner Randall seconded a motion to nominate Carol Randall for Vice Chair.

MOTION Chair Saul moved and Vice Chair Frost seconded a motion to nominate Chris Frost for Vice Chair.

The question was called and Commissioner Randall and Vice Chair Frost each received two votes.

In response to Vice Chair Frost, Recording Secretary Linden stated she would research whether the Commission could have two members serve as Co-Vice Chairs and would report back at the next meeting.

CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Commission continued the Election of Vice Chair to the October 5, 2016 meeting.

ADJOURNMENT



RECOMMENDED ACTION: Accept nominations and elect a Vice Chair for the Public Safety Commission.

DISCUSSION: The annual election of a Chair and Vice Chair for the Public Safety Commission was on the agenda for the Commission's Regular meeting on September 7, 2016, and Chair Saul was unanimously elected to serve as Chair.

There were two nominations for the position of Vice Chair. Due to a vacancy on the Commission, there were only four active members at the time of the election and, when the question was called, each nominee received two votes. The Commission asked staff to research whether two members could serve as Co-Vice Chairs, and continued the item to the October 5, 2016 meeting.

According to City Council Policy No. 10 (attached), which established basic rules for all commissions and committees, "Each City Commission shall ... annually elect one of its members as chairperson and another of its members as vice chairperson." Therefore, only one member shall be elected as Vice Chair.

The vacancy on the Commission has been filled, and the Commission should re-open the floor for new nominations to elect a Vice Chair.

City Council Policy

Policy #10

Title: Creation and Functioning of Commissions, Boards and Committees and City Council Subcommittees; describing the respective roles of the City Council, City Council Subcommittees and City Commissions, Boards and Committees in the formulation of City laws, policies, programs and services.

Purpose: To establish the means by which advisory groups and subcommittees of the City Council are created and governed and to set forth the relationship between the City Council, Council subcommittees and City commissions, boards and committees.

Policy Statement: All commissions, boards and committees appointed by the City Council and all subcommittees of the City Council shall be established by City Council ordinance or resolution and be subject to the provisions of California's Open Meeting Law. Said ordinance or resolutions shall include a charter of the area of advisement of the commissions, boards and committees or subcommittee of the City Council. The area of advisement shall not be modified by the advisory commissions, boards and committees or subcommittee of the City Council except through further ordinance or resolution of the City Council.

To assist the City Council in formulating City laws, policies, programs and services, the City Council has created six, five-member City Commissions: Mobilehome Park Rent Stabilization, Planning, Public Works, Public Safety, Parks & Recreation and Telecommunications. In addition to the specific powers and duties assigned these Commissions by either State and/or City law, each City Commission shall (1) adopt rules of procedure and decorum modeled after the City Council's Rules of Procedure and Decorum; (2) annually elect one of its members as chairperson and another of its' members as vice chairperson at its regular meeting during the month of June; (3) prohibit any member from serving two consecutive terms as commission chairperson or vice chairperson unless the commission does not actually conduct business on a regularly scheduled basis; (4) hold at least one regular meeting per month, except for the month of August; (5) schedule commission meetings at a time and in a public place to encourage public participation and which does not conflict with meetings of the City Council; (6) perform the commissions' authorized work with due diligence and refrain from discussion or deliberation on powers and duties which are the sole responsibility

of the City Council and its subcommittees unless otherwise directed to do so by a vote of the City Council.

Implementation:

Under State and City law, only the City Council can adopt laws (ordinances), approve the City budget and budget amendments, authorize appropriations, approve contracts for the provision of City services and programs, adopt resolutions and motions which set City policy, represent the City in intergovernmental relations, appoint city commissioners and other advisory boards and committees, appoint the City Manager, City Attorney and City Treasurer, and direct the work of the City staff, contract employees and consultants through the City Manager.

To divide up the workload, the City Council has formed six, two-member City Council subcommittees: Administration and Finance; Land Use and Planning; Public Works; Public Safety; Recreation and Parks; and Telecommunications. These subcommittees make recommendations to the City Council on staff (personnel) oversight matters, the negotiation and awarding of City contracts; the City budget and amendments to the budget, proposed legal agreements, intergovernmental relations and any other work assigned to the subcommittees by a vote of the City Council.

All commissions, boards and committees appointed by the City Council shall be created by ordinance or resolution. The ordinance or resolution shall, at a minimum, set forth the number of members to be appointed of the advisory body if it is not established by state statute, set forth eligibility for selection to the advisory body, set forth the charter or area of advisement of the advisory body, and the established date, time and location of the regular meetings of the advisory body, if required. The City Manager shall assign a staff liaison person to each advisory group who shall act as ex-officio secretary to the advisory group with the responsibility preparing and disseminating the agendas for all meetings of the advisory group and creating a record of the proceedings of the group at each meeting. This policy and its requirements shall not apply to ad hoc committees created by the Council from either among its own membership or from among the membership of the City's various commissions, boards and committees or subcommittees.

City commissions are expected to communicate their recommendations regarding policies, projects and programs directly to the City Council for consideration. Normally this is done by establishing a proposed plan of work for each fiscal year, communicating the commission's recommendations to the City Council and having the City Council endorse the work plan. However, from time to time the City Council may direct an item of work to a commission, board or committee outside of the normal work plan schedule or the commission, board or committee may have a matter brought to its attention which it feels needs attention from the

City. In such case the commission, board or committee is encouraged to prepare a brief report to the City Council which will then be placed on a City Council agenda for consideration as an added work plan item. Commissions may not direct administrative staff to initiate major programs, conduct large studies, or establish department policy. City staff assigned to furnish staff services shall be available to provide general staff assistance, such as preparation of agenda materials and general review of department programs and activities, and to perform limited studies, program reviews, background materials related to commission agenda items, and other services of a general staff nature. Commissions may not establish department work programs or determine department program priorities unless specifically authorized in their prescribed powers and duties. The responsibility for setting policy and allocating scarce City resources properly rests with the City's duly elected representatives, the City Council, and cannot be delegated to an outside group, however capable and interested it might be.




DISCUSSION: The City contracts with the County of Los Angeles for public safety services provided by the Sheriff's Department, Fire Department and Lifeguards. The City Council directed the Public Safety Commission to conduct an annual review of those services as part of the Commission's Fiscal Year 2016-2017 assignments.

The Lifeguards provided a year-to-date statistical report for January 1 through September 27, 2016, which is attached for Commission review. Representatives from each of the three agencies will provide brief overviews of the services provided in Malibu over the past year and will answer questions from the Commission. The Commission may make recommendations to the City Council for adjustments to service levels, if appropriate.



Subject: 2016 Summer Beach Enforcement Operation Summary

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Receive and file summary report of the 2016 Summer Beach Enforcement Operation.

DISCUSSION: The Malibu Summer Enforcement Operation began with two training days prior to deployment on May 28, 2016 (Memorial Day weekend), and ended on Monday, September 5, 2016 (Labor Day). The two training days consisted of departmentally-approved Quad Runner training, crowd control, tactical planning, and tactical communication, as well as Penal, Vehicle, and Municipal Code updates for Summer Enforcement Team operations. This year was the fifth year of the implemented 4/10 schedule, which is a four-day work week of ten-hour shifts for each deputy assigned to the team. The increased visibility and additional daily enforcement was extremely successful in maintaining safety and enforcement for the beach community and on Pacific Coast Highway.

The annual Summer Enforcement Team has become a vital resource to the community of Malibu. The City of Malibu partners with the Sheriff's Department each summer to ensure a safe and wholesome beach environment for the residents and visitors of Malibu. The Sheriff's Department selects an extremely motivated team of sworn and non-sworn Sheriff's Department personnel to provide a strong, visible, pro-active police presence from the ground and air, coupled with strict enforcement of all applicable laws.

This year's core team, comprised of one sergeant and eight deputies, faced great challenges given the vast number of visitors arriving at beach destinations within the City. The enforcement efforts were focused on the most popular of the City's adjacent County and State beaches, its designated beach parking areas, its main canyon roadways and the City's main access artery, Pacific Coast Highway.

In an effort to supplement the dedicated summer enforcement team of eight deputies and one sergeant, City funds were included to cover the cost of several key support elements, which were designed to enhance the overall Summer Enforcement operation. These support elements included a dedicated traffic car, motorcycle patrol, parking enforcement, traffic control, and secretarial services needed to process the large amount of enforcement paperwork generated by the team throughout the summer months.

A summary of the Malibu Beach Team statistical activity for 2016 is listed below to illustrate the team's concerted and highly motivated efforts.

In addition to the above citations, 70 lost children were reunited with their families. The Summer Enforcement budget dedicated by the City of Malibu was augmented, with no additional cost to the City, through hundreds of volunteer patrol hours from several of the Sheriff's Department Reserve Units, including Malibu/Lost Hills Station Reserves, North Patrol Division Mounted Posse, and civilian Volunteers on Patrol. The City also benefited from the services of a Sheriff's Department Air Unit, which was instrumental in maintaining

a strong presence, identifying and locating possible drunk drivers on PCH, helping find lost children, and creating a deterrent to crime on the beach and surrounding areas.

Through their dedication and calming presence, this year's deployment of deputies and volunteers overcame many challenges while working with thousands of residents and hundreds of thousands of visitors who enjoy the City of Malibu during the summer months. This year's Summer Enforcement Team effort was a complete success, resulting in a remarkably peaceful summer of 2016.



Subject: Update on Improvement Projects Recommended in the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Safety Study

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Receive and file status updates of Improvement Projects recommended in the PCH Safety Study and provide feedback to staff.

DISCUSSION: In 2012, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) and the City of Malibu commissioned a study to analyze and identify potential safety improvements along the PCH corridor within the Malibu city limits. The study was completed in June 2015 and included a list of recommended projects to improve safety on PCH. The list contains 130 projects and, except for the more complex projects, they can potentially be implemented with assistance from Caltrans, but will require design, permitting, and construction. All projects must also go through a project evaluation to ensure that they are in compliance with currently accepted practices, design standards, and regulations. It should be noted that even the seemingly simplest projects may require a considerable amount of time to complete where procurement of services, design, bidding, and construction is required. Complex projects generally required further feasibility study, which normally led to an overall longer project completion time. Additionally, project funding is always challenging and usually plays a significant factor in the existence and schedule of any improvement project. Attached are the latest updates on the status of those improvement projects.

The Commission may provide staff with a list of questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans. Responses to those questions will be reported back to the Commission at its next Regular meeting.



Subject: Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project; b) Slope Erosion Project (Caltrans); c) Nautica Malibu Triathlon; and d) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

DISCUSSION: Below are the latest updates on the status of projects in and around Malibu that affect traffic and public safety on PCH and City streets:

- a) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project (City of Santa Monica) – The City of Santa Monica re-opened the California Incline, the main connector road between PCH and Ocean Avenue, on September 1, at 5:00 PM, following a 17-month project to construct a new bridge that includes a wider sidewalk and bicycle lanes.
- b) Slope Erosion Project (Caltrans) – Caltrans is applying steel fiber-reinforced sprayed concrete (shotcrete) to an ocean-side slope near Big Rock Drive along PCH to prevent additional erosion to the slope supporting the highway and to help protect utility lines. Work began in mid-September and is expected to finish in late-October. The work requires a shoulder closure on southbound PCH and intermittent, temporary lane closures of southbound lanes will be required for equipment movement. Construction crews will work Monday through Friday, but tidal influences may require crews to adjust work schedules. Construction noise and vibrations may occur when crews operate construction equipment. Motorists and cyclists are reminded to share the road in the

work zone. The finished sea wall will be 20-feet tall and 150-feet wide. The contractor will insert steel rebar into the slope, spray shotcrete onto the exposed slopes, and rearrange rocks that are already on the beach to help protect the bottom (toe) of the slope.

- c) Nautica Malibu Triathlon –Caltrans permitted the closure of PCH from Busch Drive to Deer Creek Road on September 17 and 18, 2016, from 5:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. for the Nautica Malibu Triathlon. City street closures for the 2-day event included:
- The entrance to Broad Beach East (Broad Beach Road and Trancas Canyon Road)
 - Busch Drive between PCH and Zuma Beach Plaza
 - PCH access to Westward Beach Road; however, Birdview Avenue remained open for access to Westward Beach
 - Morning View Drive between PCH and Merritt Drive
- d) Caltrans Maintenance Work (PCH within Malibu) – According to Caltrans, highway maintenance crews performed paving operations on southbound PCH just north of Tuna Canyon Road.

The Commission may provide staff with a list of questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans. Responses to those questions will be reported back to the Commission at its next Regular meeting.



II. NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS



SCHOOL ISSUES

We investigated a battery involving Malibu High students at an off campus party.

INTERVENTIONS

No interventions were held this month.

COMMUNITY / CRIMINAL ISSUES

1. We conducted a monthly parental resource class at Lost Hills Sheriff's Station. This program was developed by our unit and is designed to educate parents about: 1) The current trends in juvenile behavior and delinquency, 2) Alcohol/narcotic awareness and recognition, 3) School policy and campus issues, 4) Gang awareness and negative peer relations, 5) Parental rights and responsibilities and, 6) Parental responses to incorrigible and/or delinquent behavior. We also address the specific concerns relating to the minor's behavior. We educate the minor and their parents of possible criminal behavior and the legal consequences. We offer suggestions and make recommendations to improve the minor's quality of life.
2. We spoke with numerous citizens and parents who called to question various juvenile concerns and issues in the community. We also provide the parents with various juvenile resource programs within our community.
3. We met with the Sylmar Juvenile Court District Attorney regarding the investigation and filing of criminal charges against juvenile offenders.
4. We met with Captain Pat Davoren throughout the month in order to keep him up to date regarding our unit's investigations and current juvenile issues within our city.
5. We entered juveniles into the Juvenile Automated Index system for various violations.
6. We made court appearances to testify as witnesses on the part of the People of the State of California and attended court proceedings in cases generated from the City of Malibu. We also investigated, prepared, and filed cases with the District Attorney's office. We additionally assisted other investigators in the preparation of cases for court.
7. We met with station narcotic detectives on a regular basis to exchange information regarding juvenile and drug related issues. We have worked with the narcotic detectives on several narcotic cases directly and indirectly involving juveniles.

8. We handled the processing and follow-up of various juvenile referrals brought to the attention of this unit (i.e., Juvenile Information Forms, Field Interview Cards, Juvenile Automated Index, and citations for various juvenile contacts with uniform personnel).
9. We conducted our normal checks of juvenile problem areas in the city during weekend evenings and responded to juvenile related calls for service.
10. The Juvenile Intervention Team assisted the COPS Team with Parole Compliance checks in Malibu, Topanga, Calabasas and Westlake Village.
11. We investigated 2 allegation of child abuse.
12. We registered 6 sex offenders.
13. We met with engage therapists to schedule a Reality Party.

- National Night Out, Woodard and I attended a block party in Calabasas hosted by area residents and members of the Calabasas city council.
- Concert in the Park in Agoura Hills.
- Ongoing training with Fire Dept. on doing more mapping and scouting of fire roads and motorways for usable wild fire escape routes. Fire department dropped off more and up dated fire maps for the station's EOC.
- Continuing to work with L.A.County Data Officers from I.T.S. and T.&S.D. on a project to load our escape route maps on to the MDC network.
- Working on "Ride to the Flags" M/C ride taking place on 9-11 in Malibu.
- Working and meeting with Malibu residents who have safety concerns about the growing number of homeless living in their vehicles and hanging behind the Malibu Urgent Care and at the vacant post office building next door. CIT Team monthly patrol requests briefing and email asking patrol to please check and log any actions taken.
- Working with area resident about their complaints of the increasing numbers of cars parked for sale on PCH near Heathercliff and on PCH near Webb Way. CIT Team monthly patrol requests briefing and email asked patrol to please check and log any actions taken. I checked these areas and vehicles are being red tagged. I was told that vehicles have been towed from the PCH and Webb Way area per 22651k cvc 72hr violation.
- PCH Task Force meeting in Malibu (Multi law enforcement agencies, public works, Caltrans, city, state, and congressmen office.) talked about traffic safety issues, pedestrian crossing and traffic control signals at marked crosswalks, more marked crosswalks, placement of CMS signs on PCH near El Matador State Beach and bicycle safety.
- PCH Coordination and Communication meeting with LAPD, SMPD, CHP, City of Malibu and City of L.A. Staff. Working on putting together a contact list and a better way of getting PCH information out to all 4 agencies.
- Contacted members of Malibu Public Safety Commission to see what this month's public safety issues where. See listed Emails and patrol requests sent out regarding their safety issues.

- Meeting with Rambla Pacifico roadway HOA regarding sports cars racing on Rambla above the gated area on the weekends around 0200hrs Sunday mornings. I sent out a Patrol request for the early morning Malibu units to do patrols of that area. I talked with Malibu city hall and there is no current speed survey for this area. UTL any survey for at least 15 years. Arthur from public works is working on trying to see if a survey can be done for this area.
- I sent out a patrol request for all shifts to monitor the area near NOBU and SOHO for parking and traffic violation, special attention to Uber and Lift drivers and paparazzi parking/stopping illegally in bus zone w/red curb, blocking traffic lane to make a pick up or drop off and illegal U-turns on PCH. Posted a copy of the cvc section for red curb violations. I w/a drivers and paparazzi to move. I have issued parking cites there.
- Talked to valet staff members about the city ordinance requiring them to wear high visibility clothing. On 08-19-16 in the evening (dusk) I stopped and talked to valets about their need to wear high visibility clothing and running crossing PCH in traffic.
- Weekly visits to Malibu City hall to say hi and see what new issues or requests they need us to handle.
- Malibu/Lost Hills Station's EOC's B/O TV replaced and the B/O radio back from the radio repair shop. Now all of the normally used equipment is up and running.
- 08-09-16 we took part in a county wide LACDCS noontime net test day. 3 LHS DCS members checked in from remote location in our patrol area.
- Assisted Calabasas CIT Team member with traffic flow issue due to road construction. Deputy Raney then came out to Malibu to assist me with planning traffic flow issues with my cities planned road work.
- 08-19-16 worked a Malibu DUI check point on PCH at Webb Way.
- I did early morning patrol checks of Malibu Country Estates re: on going complaints of overnight parking without a parking permit (0200-0530hrs). I issued 5 parking tickets on 08-20-16.

- On 08-22-16 I monitored 1st day of school traffic at Malibu HS/MS and Juan Cabrillo Elm schools. Cite 1 area resident re: unsafe passing school area traffic. Warn and advised numerous parents about parking and stopping in the right turn only lane. Issued 1 parking cite to car I observed parked in no parking/tow away zone for over an hour.

- I monitored traffic in these 2 areas in regards to reports of large commercial trucks parked near 22305 PCH and on Trancas Cyn offloading causing dangerous traffic conditions. I have checked these area several times at different hours of the day and have not seen any violations.
- I have made several patrol checks of the Point Dume to monitor traffic conditions and golf cart violations. On 08-14-16 I w/a a summertime renter that he cannot driver an unlicensed golf cart on the street and cited a local employee for stop sign violation. I have made continued requests for patrol deputies, CSO's, and VOP's to monitor area for parking and traffic law violations. They are all making their checks and logging the citations and actions they have taken.
- Put out constant new patrol request updates to field deputies received from Lt Royal, City of Malibu staff, businesses, and Malibu residences.
- 08-23-16 meeting with LAFD Capt. and (2) Bat B.C.'s at LHS EOC regarding mutual aid during major emergency. Discussed areas of concern for evacuations in fire event.
- Worked with the Fire Dept.'s radio repairmen this month to keep their equipment updated in our EOC for better communication with Fire Dept.
- Working with CHP, LAPD, and SMPD regarding a Wednesday "Bike Night" enforcement taskforce team for motorcycles racing in station areas. On 08-31-16 we did a multiagency "Bike Night" enforcement night with CHP in Malibu, Topanga, and Mulholland Hwy areas. LASD and CHP fielded 8 motor officer and 4 patrol cars. Several contacts were made and citations were issued.
- Working with senator Pavley's office regarding traffic alerts in the city of Malibu.
- Working with CHP to have their two CMS trailers placed on PCH at El Matador State Beach warning drivers of pedestrians crossing the Hwy. Two trailers were placed on PCH the week of 08-23-16 and will remain there until after Labor Day weekend.
- Continue my ongoing work with Senator Pavley's, Supervisor Kuehl's offices, city of Malibu, CART and several homeless shelters and outreach programs to find housing and help for the homeless in Malibu.
- Created a Malibu City Directed Patrol spread sheet and a Malibu deputy email list for the directed patrols.
- Collected stats regarding directed patrols performed in the city.
